CONNECTING SCIENTIFIC KNOWLEDGE WITH TRADITIONAL ECOLOGICAL KNOWLEDGE ON THE LAND

In Science 9 this semester, students have been learning about the interconnectedness of the biogeochemical cycles (water, nitrogen, phosphorus, and carbon cycles). Throughout, there has been a threading of the knowledge brought to this topic by both scientific research and traditional ecological knowledge. Specifically, students learned about the overarching belief that we are borrowing from the present and must ensure the ability to pass on to the future generations.

The unit culminated with a trip on the land to see how human interactions have changed our environment and what knowledge this has uncovered about the nutrient cycles. Students learned about the impacts of fire and infrastructure development and how nature responds to these changes.

We ended our trip by giving back to the community through seed spreading, fire protection support, and invasive species removal.







E-scooters at SOSS

There has been an increase in the number of e-scooters and e-bikes being used to commute to SOSS. Electric scooters, bikes, skateboards, and scooters are a great environmentally responsible mode of transportation. Unfortunately, some safety concerns have been arising as well. We have also had several community complaints of students riding unsafely.

Students who ride to school on e-scooters, e-bikes, bikes, skateboard; and scooters are reminded of the following expectations:

-please ride safely to and from school
-please wear a helmet

-students are not permitted to ride on school property (riding to the entrance on the road is fine)
-please do not ride on sidewalks

-please store e-scooters, bikes, and scooters at the bike and scooter racks at the front of the school (do not bring them into the school)

-skateboards should be stored in lockers

-BC regulations say you must be 16 or older to ride an e-scooter in BC
-BC regulations only permit one rider on an e-scooter
-BC regulations only permit a maximum speed capability of 25 km/h

Students who are riding unsafely to school will be asked to find another method of transportation.

Please discuss these responsibilities with your child who is riding to school.

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

In the Okanagan Similkameen School District, we want schools to be safe, supportive, and welcoming places for students to learn and for staff to work. A key part of creating this environment is how we communicate and work together as a community.

We deeply value the partnership between home and school and ask for your support in the following areas:

Communication

- Please follow our process when concerns arise: Begin by making an appointment to speak with your child's teacher, and if more follow-up is needed, contact the school administration. Additional information can be found in Board Policy F-10 Dispute Resolution Policy
- Use respectful language in all communication, whether in person, on the phone, or through
- email.
- Please understand that responses may not always be immediate. Staff will do their best to
- communicate with you as soon as possible.
 Clarify your child's perspective with staff to better understand the full picture, and work toward calm, reasonable solutions.
 - Avoid using social media to air complaints. It does not resolve concerns and often makes situations harder for everyone involved.

Partnership

- Support your child's regular attendance at school and reach out if you need help with this.
- Work with staff to find solutions when issues come up.
- Review and discuss the Student Code of Conduct with your child so they understand expectations.

Conduct

• When visiting the school, please remain calm and respectful. Swearing, inappropriate language, threats, or verbal abuse are not acceptable.

School Culture

• Please join us in treating all members of our school community with dignity and respect. This includes respecting diversity in identity, race, culture, beliefs, family status, abilities, gender, and age, as outlined by the BC Human Rights Code.

Together, we can build a school environment where all students and adults feel safe, respected, and supported in their learning. Thank you for your partnership in this important work.
